COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Comprehensive Exam for the leadership core will assess the student's knowledge of the field of leadership, as well as their ability to synthesize material and master concepts and theories. Successful completion of the comprehensive exam is required for degree completion.

SPECIFICS OF COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

The instructor will provide grading rubrics that will provide more detail as to how this assignment will be graded.

Application Paper

Students will select a case study related to their field of study and apply what they have learned in the doctoral program to establish a well-supported position and make research-supported recommendations. Students must demonstrate analysis, synthesis, and evaluation of the research related to the specific organizational/educational challenge identified in their case study.

The application paper should clearly demonstrate critical thinking and information literacy.

Critical thinking: think critically and reflect upon the case study and the larger context in which it takes place, clearly identifying the challenge.

Information literacy: find, access, evaluate, and use information to solve problems, craft logical arguments, and draw well-reasoned conclusions.

The paper should also demonstrate the following: (a) a critical analysis of information presented about the current state of an organization; (b) effective strategies from current research that guide the organization to change and adapt to future challenges; (c) a project-oriented approach to lead organizations through innovative and visionary leadership (in table

format [elements of the table may include, but should not be limited to, timelines, resources, anticipated obstacles, deadlines, responsible parties, etc.]); and (d) global and diverse perspectives that can address a variety of stakeholders.

This paper will be 20-25 pages, in APA format, with at least ten (10) peer-reviewed references.

Leadership Philosophy Paper

Students will analyze, synthesize, and evaluate at least two leadership theories that were presented in leadership core classes to answer the questions: (1) Who am I as a leader? and (2) How will I develop leaders of the future?

This leadership philosophy paper should clearly demonstrate: (a) ethics; (b) diverse and global perspectives; and (c) lifelong learning.

Ethics: Students take responsibility for their own actions and exhibit high standards of conduct in their professional lives. They are aware of the ethical expectations of their profession and hold themselves accountable to those standards.

Diverse and Global Perspectives: Students embrace the opportunity to work collaboratively with individuals from a variety of backgrounds, and to learn from the beliefs, values, and cultures of others. They recognize that varied viewpoints bring strength and richness to the workplace.

Lifelong Learning: In a world where knowledge and skills must be constantly updated, students demonstrate inquisitive, independent, reflective and self-directed behaviors in seeking out ways to engage with learning.

This paper will incorporate at least two (2) leadership theories combined with real world examples of the student's leadership to answer the two questions. It should also contain a discussion of how the student will develop the ethical leaders of the future who can incorporate social and environmental responsibility into organizational strategies.

This paper will be 10-15 pages in APA format with at least ten (10) peer-reviewed references. This paper can be written in first person or third person but do not switch back and forth.

COURSE POLICIES

Late Assignments

Students are required to submit all assignments by the due dates stated in the course schedule. A late assignment is one that is submitted after the due date or after any extension has expired.

If circumstances prevent a student from meeting the due date, the student needs to contact the instructor and request an extension at least 48 hours prior to the date the assignment is due. Emergency situations will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Being busy, pressured with outside work, technical issues, or having competing academic commitments are not valid reasons to grant extensions. A student who receives an extension in advance of the due date and abides by the agreement with the instructor is not subject to late penalties.

Without prior arrangement with the instructor, students who submit assignments late will receive a 5% deduction in grade each day or part of the day that the assignment is late up to a maximum of 25% off. Coursework received after 10 days will not be graded and will receive a zero grade, unless prior arrangements have been made.

Professional Writing

Assignments require error-free writing that uses standard English conventions and logical flow of organization to address topics clearly, completely, and concisely. CityU requires the use of APA style.

Participation

Participation is determined through your active engagement in classroom activities each week. This can be measured through your discussion board posts or by submitting an assignment when due.
