## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Substance abuse is one of the fastest-growing and most potentially destructive phenomena of contemporary life. In this course, students will learn about the theoretical models that attempt to explain the causes, contributing factors, and solutions to substance abuse among various populations, including adolescents, the elderly, and various cultural, social, and ethnic groups.

## **COURSE OUTCOMES**

- Establish an awareness of local resources, such as treatment centers, recovery homes, support groups, etc.
- Explain the basic patterns of drug distribution within the body
- Explain ways of classifying drugs and addictive substances
- Describe the current methods and models of research on and treatment of addictions
- Demonstrate understanding of the roles of professionals working with people addicted to various substances
- Evaluate the ways gender, ethnicity, age, and other personal characteristics influence the experience of addictions treatment
- Evaluate the impact of addictions on individual, family, and society

### Application papers (equally weighted)

Students will write three Application Papers as part of the assignments to meet the learning objectives of this course. Application Papers will investigate, examine, and present the impacts of substance of abuse on the individual, family, and community/society, as well as additional topics relevant to the assigned Application Paper. The course instructor will provide clear expectations, guidelines, and rubric for each Application Paper. Application Papers must meet APA requirements of format and style.

Application Paper #1 Substances of Abuse: Alcohol and other drugs.

In this paper, students will have to focus on how substances of abuse impact the individual (physiologically and psychologically). It has to be at least five pages long and students have to demonstrate the use of text and at least two other credible, peer-reviewed resources.

Application Paper #2 Addiction and the Family: It effects more than just the addict.

In this paper, students will have to discuss how substances of abuse impact the user and the family. This paper has to be at least five pages long and students have to demonstrate the use of text and at least two

other credible, peer-reviewed resources.

### Application Paper #3 Addiction and the Community: Social impacts of addiction

In this paper, students will discuss how substances of abuse impact community and society as well as how treatment programs approach addiction for treatment and recovery. Students will also have to demonstrate their investigation of a community treatment/recovery program. This paper has to be at least seven pages long and students are required to use of text and at least two other credible, peer-reviewed resources
