Topics include: cost accounting information for improving efficiency, product and service quality, total quality management, project management, materials resource planning, value creation, supply chain management and economic value. SPECIFICS OF COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Case Analysis (3):

The instructor will provide three cases to students throughout the quarter. The cases are designed to encourage students to apply proper methods, tools, techniques, and frameworks to analyze various operations management scenarios and develop relevant solutions, action plans, and/or recommendations. The cases will challenge students’ understanding and application of key concepts, such as new product and service design, managing information flows (MRP and ERP), and location and logistics. A different case will be utilized each quarter; therefore, requirements for each case will vary depending upon the nature of the scenario of interest. Accordingly, specific instructions and set of requirements (e.g., format, references, and page count) will be included in the description of each case.
